GENERAL NEWS AND INFORMATION

TRAFFIC IN WARBOYS

One of the most frequent complaints to the Parish Council is traffic in Warboys. This can be motorists driving too fast in Ramsey Road, Church Road, High Street, Fenton Road, Station Road or Mahaddie Way; exceeding the 60 mph limit on the A141 and Puddock Road; the volume of HGVs and farm traffic travelling through the village; boy racers with noisy exhausts; parking on pavements and verges; congestion in some roads that simply weren't built to take the volume of today's traffic where most households have at least two cars; parking and deliveries at the SPAR shop. Added to this are complaints about potholes, subsidence and damage to verges and then of drivers travelling too fast on roads that have been resurfaced in Fenton Road, Fenside Road and Puddock Road.

This isn't helped by the highway authority, Cambridgeshire County Council, tending to refer complainants to town and parish councils because their funding has been cut and the amount of enforcement that the Police are able to carry out, again because of limited funding and other priorities.

The Parish Council actually has very few powers when it comes to highways and cannot act independently of the County Council. It certainly isn't able to solve all the complaints received, much of which are due to the actions of irresponsible drivers.

The County Council does permit one application per annum from the Parish Council for small scale improvements where bids have to compete for limited funding against applications from across each District Council area, in our

case the whole of Huntingdonshire. County Council funding is limited to £15,000 per scheme with the balance having to be met by the successful applicant. In this way, the Parish Council has successfully bid for and part funded the 30 roundels and dragons' teeth at the entrances to the village, priority narrowing and gateways in Fenton Road, speed humps and 20 mph zone in Humberdale Way, limited parking outside the school, speed activated signs in Church Road and Ramsey Road, and resurfacing of a stretch of the High Street pavement. A 40 mph buffer zone will be implemented shortly and gateway signs installed in Ramsey Road and a bid is currently being evaluated by the County Council for further traffic calming at the entrance to the village in Ramsey Road.

In addition, the Parish Council has funded the limited waiting outside the chemists, replaced streetlamps in New Road, improved the lighting at the High Street pedestrian crossings and bought equipment to enable the local Speedwatch team of volunteers to have their own camera. The Council refers complaints to highway officers and the neighbourhood policing team where appropriate and the Clerk is sometimes able to work with colleagues in those organisations to effect improvements. Often though the issue comes back to bad driving, whether driving too fast or with noisy exhausts or parking on pavements or grass verges.

A working party is currently meeting residents to discuss the issue of HGVs and farm vehicles in the village. It's unfortunate that the local Speedwatch team have been unable to operate for most of 2020 due to lockdown restrictions but they are always looking for new volunteers to enable more sessions to take place. The Parish Council is doing what it can to address residents' concerns and while successes have been achieved, the answers often lie in the hands of every one of us to take care and to think of others by driving responsibly.

Ready, steady, CENSUS 2021

An official census has been undertaken in this country every ten years since 1801 with the obvious exception of 1941. This means that a new census is due and this will be taking place as planned on Sunday 21 March.

The census is being organised by the Office for National Statistics and they are confident that everyone will be able to provide their information safely and securely. Census forms can be filled in online as soon as you get your access code in the post. If your household circumstances change on Census Day, you can let the ONS know. If you, or anyone you know, needs help, there will be a wide range of support services available.

It's important that everyone completes and returns their census questionnaire. The returns are confidential but without the information gathered, there won't be an accurate picture of Warboys and what the community needs. It provides the data for Government support, NHS provision, schools and much more.

Households will receive a letter with a unique access code in the post, allowing them to complete their questionnaire online. Paper questionnaires will be available on request. For more information, visit **census.gov.uk**

UPDATE from the MOAT HOUSE SURGERY

We would all like to wish you a Happy New Year from the Moat House Surgery. We would also like to thank you for all your understanding and support throughout the Covid19 pandemic during the last year. We wish that we could be in a better situation at the start of 2021 but we find ourselves facing new challenges and remain optimistic for the New Year (even though we might have to wait a while for this!).

We are trying our very hardest to continue to support you during this current lockdown. We have had to take the difficult decision to keep our main Surgery access door closed and to restrict access to those who have a pre-booked appointment. We are trying very much to reduce any unnecessary footfall throughout the Surgery to reduce the risk to our own staff and to our patients who do need to come in and see us. Like all general practices across the country, we have had to prioritise our workload to providing emergency and urgent care to those with urgent medical problems as well as obviously continuing to treat those affected by the Covid19 virus. We are also continuing to run our long term condition clinics (for those patients with long term problems like COPD, diabetes, asthma or heart problems). Where we can do this safely using a telephone consultation then we will always do this preferentially. We appreciate that this is a real change to the way that we usually "do business". We are very sad that we cannot see you in person in the way that we used to but unfortunately this is the way it has to be currently. We look forward to a time later in the year when we will be able to see our patients again in person.

PLEASE DO CONTINUE TO STAY HOME, PROTECT THE NHS AND SAVE LIVES.

On a more positive note, you will be aware that the Covid19 vaccination programme has begun. Your Doctors, Nurses, Healthcare Assistants and Reception staff will all be playing a part in this and, at times, will be seconded to other locations to help with the immunisations to those in the priority groups. Currently, for our patients, we are still very much focused Priority Group 1 and 2, which is our care home residents and those over the age of 80. The vaccination programme began in earnest locally just last week. Vaccinations currently cannot be given in every general practice setting and so our patients will currently need to go to St lves to receive their vaccination. It might well be that at some stage over the next few months we are able to offer vaccinations from the Moat House site but there is currently no provision for us to be able to do this. We will of course keep you posted.

In the meantime, we would request your ongoing patience as staff from the Surgery are seconded to other vaccination sites to help out. This will mean that at times, we do not have the same number of staff here and we would ask for your understanding in this regard.

ABOUT THE VACCINATION PRGRAMME & STAYING WELL

COVID-19 Vaccination Programme - an update from our vaccination hub

We are all working incredibly hard to deliver the Covid-19 vaccine and are on track to offer vaccines to our most vulnerable patients by the middle of February. Understandably, this is very challenging to deliver. Our practice is part of a group of local GP practices called the St Ives Primary Care Network (PCN) looking after the healthcare of patients in the local area. It was agreed nationally that the vaccinations will be delivered to one GP practice within each PCN which will act as a hub to give the vaccinations to patients of all practices within the PCN. By using one location it means we can use all our skilled staff in one location to provide the vaccination clinics.

Our local vaccination hub is the Old Exchange Surgery on East Street in St lves.

Our site became operational on Saturday 16 January 2021. We are notified about each vaccine delivery three days before it is due to arrive and only then can we start to book patients in. The vaccine priority groups (i.e. who gets called for a vaccine and when) have been decided centrally by NHS England. We have no ability to alter this or make exceptions. The first groups to be vaccinated are over 80s, care home residents and staff, health and social care workers. As we have almost completed these groups, we will soon start inviting patients in their late 70s.

As each cohort is completed, we can then begin calling those in the next priority group. We are not allowed to offer a choice of vaccine. Again, this is a national mandate. Our priority has to be to ensure that no vaccine is wasted, and that every dose is given to an eligible patient. Automated booking systems are being used to help deal with the huge administrative task of booking thousands of vaccine appointments in an extremely tight timescale and to ensure the process is easy and efficient for our patients to use.

Those with mobile phone numbers on their records will be contacted by text initially, therefore if we do not have a record of your current mobile number, please ensure you update us with your mobile number. As soon as we are able to book appointments for your age group you will be contacted.

We understand that everyone is eager to have the vaccine, but please **DO NOT** contact Reception about this until you are invited to do so. As we are sure you can imagine, we are all working incredibly hard to deliver the vaccine to our patients, at the same time as providing care to all those who need it. Thank you for your ongoing support.

For anyone who's had their vaccine it's essential you continue to follow national guidelines as well as continuing to wash your hands, wear a face mask and social distance from other people.

Be sure to also stock up your medicine cabinet with winter self-care essentials too. Many over-the-counter medicines (including paracetamol and ibuprofen) are available to help relieve symptoms of common winter illnesses and you can find **further information at www.nhs.uk**

MORE NEWS AND INFORMATION

The Old Village Board School Trust (OVBST)

The OVBST was formed when the site of the old school (where the Library is currently located) was sold off and the school transferred to the new site in Humberdale Way. Some of the money was invested and the interest from that money can be used to give small grants to young people from Warboys to help with their education. Young people must live within the parish of Warboys or within half a mile of the parish boundary and should be aged less than 25 years. Grants can be used

- for the purchase of special educational materials like books or equipment for College or University
- to buy special tools needed by someone who is undergoing special training or starting out in a trade or craft
- to purchase special sporting equipment or musical instruments
- for educational travel to broaden the education and experience of young people
- to allow young people to undergo special training courses that may not otherwise be available to them

It can also be used by school and youth groups, e.g. sports, religious or uniformed groups in the Warboys area to provide equipment to further the education and development of local young people.
